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
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From the editor

Swiss or Arena?

These days, after the spread of online chess tournaments, one of the topics that is widely discussed among chess players is the system of holding these tournaments: Swiss or Arena?

Having strengths and weaknesses, these two systems have their fans. It is clear that the Swiss system, which is traditionally used in open competitions, is more logical and may be a more accurate system for determining the winners, but we must admit that this system is less exciting than the Arena and you might have to wait several minutes between rounds for the next game.

Today, in addition to competition, young players are looking for more excitement, which the Arena system meets. Playing non-stop, using Berserk, rewarding players with bonus points and having a strategy for a long marathon have made this system popular.

Of course, it may be easier for the Unity team to hold and control the tournament in the Swiss system, but according to the factors mentioned above, the Arena system has been selected. The system that can only be used in online competitions and has practically run circles around its opponent!

The 17th week report

The seventeenth week of the Unity tournament was very exciting. 1218 players from 65 countries competed in this week. 102 GM, 155 IM, and 200 FM are brilliant statistics that cannot be ignored. The following three countries had the highest number of players:

255 Players
163 Players
106 Players





It was not clear until the final moments who would be the champion. While Parham Maghsoodloo (2676) was at the top of the table with one minute left in the finish, GM Dmitry Andreikin (2782) was able to overtake him and repeat his championship last week.

After these two players, Vietnamese international master Minh Le Tuan (2501) came in third place, and among all these grandmasters, he made a surprise.

In the women's section, Azerbaijani International Master Gulnar Mammadova (2400) won first place again, and WGM Vaishali Rameshbabu (2393) from India came in second. WIM Turmunkh Munkhzul of Mongolia (2278) got third.

This week we have a familiar guest for interview; Mr. Pedram Atoufi, the successful founder of Unity Chess Club who's holding Sundays with Unity every weekend. Pedram Atoufi is the owner of Unity Chess Club and a World Chess Federation FIDE Master. He won the World Open of Philadelphia (under 2300 rating) in 2006, was a member of the Marmaris Team, winners of the 2002 Turkey Chess League and the 1992 National Youth Champion of Iran. Coach Pedram began playing chess at the age of 12, which is quite an old age for an accomplished player and teacher. Chess was banned in Iran for 10 years by the government who considered it a form of gambling, with connotations of royalty. Once this ban was lifted, chess became the passion of his life and it still is today. He has played competitively in Iran, Turkey, Asia and the US. Today he is considered one of the finest instructors in the United States.

Dear Pedram, thank you so much for taking the time to participate in this interview. Congratulations on organizing such a fantastic weekly tournament! How did it all start?

Thanks a lot for having me. We had our regular face to face weekly tournaments at the chess club until Covid-19 came. We had to close the center and stop all of our tournaments. That was the moment that we decided to continue having our Sundays weekly tournaments online and instead of Rapid, making it Blitz. The goal is to have a special tournament that all players around the world at any level come and play and enjoy and also have good chances to win the prizes. This is why

we made the tournament in 21 sections and more than 240 players have chances to win prizes.

Unity Chess Club has become the most famous chess club in Arizona since the last 10 years ago, you established it. Could you talk a little bit about the Club?

I opened Unity Chess Club in the Summer of 2008. The main focus was on coaching and preparing our students for the National and World Grades championship.









Since started we managed to have many USA grade champions and many represented the USA in World Cadets Championship. From the beginning we started having our Sunday weekly rapid tournaments G/30 + 5 as well as Monthly G/55 + 5 and later started Phoenix Annual G/90 + 30 SD/30 on Thanksgiving Weekends having players from all over the country.

We all know that a team from a large number of countries helps you with this glorious competition. How do you lead the team?

Managing this International tournament with many players all around the world wasn't easy so I came up with the idea of having representatives in different countries and becoming partners with them. With our strong team of our representatives all around the world, we can have better control of the tournaments and be more organized and move up the quality of the tournament to the next level.

Young players enjoy playing in the Arena system. What do you think about this system?

Arena system adds lots of excitement to the games, this is why lots of players enjoy playing in our tournaments even seniors above 65 years old! Players can make their time half! Winning a couple of games in a row and start getting double points!

Who is your favorite chess player in history? What about the current players?

In history, Mikhail Botvinnik. He started chess late, but he proved that by strong will and hard work you can achieve anything in your life, even becoming a world champion!

For calculations, I like "1001 Brilliant Ways to Checkmate" and "1001 Winning Chess Sacrifices and Combination" by Fred Reinfeld. Also "Perfect Your Chess" by Andrei Volokitin and Vladimir Grabinsky. For Endgame, Understanding Chess Endgames by John Nunn. For Strategy, "Mastering Chess Strategy" by Johan Hellsten. For Opening, all "Grandmaster Repertoire" by Quality Chess Publishing in my opinion are great.

What do you think about the future of the online chess tournaments after the Coronavirus Pandemic?

Online chess is connecting all chess players around the world and I believe it will grow day by day. The future of chess is in online chess.
